Justice Sunday

A Curriculum for Elementary School Students

Learning Objective

Children understand biblical justice by studying the Parable of the Good Samaritan, and make it personal by giving examples of how to love God and love their neighbor.

The Parable of the Good Samaritan

Luke 10:25-37

Teacher Prep

Pray and seek the Lord. Ask Him to reveal and make His word come alive in this lesson. Read Luke 10:25-37. Examine your heart, and apply God's truth to your life. Before class:

- Cut out a large heart
- Print out the verses used in the lesson.

Welcome!

Introduce yourself, and give the students a warm welcome. Open with prayer.

Display the cut out heart. Lead a discussion about love and justice with these questions.

What are some things that come to mind when you see a picture of a heart?

Who do you love?

How would they know that you love them?

Listen as I read what God tells us about love, 1 John 4:7: *Beloved, let us love one another for love is from God, and whoever loves has been born of God and knows God.*

Who does this verse tell us gives us love?

And 1 John 4:19 tells us: *We love because God first loved us.* God loved us first. That means before we even knew what love was he showed us.

What did God do to show His love toward us?

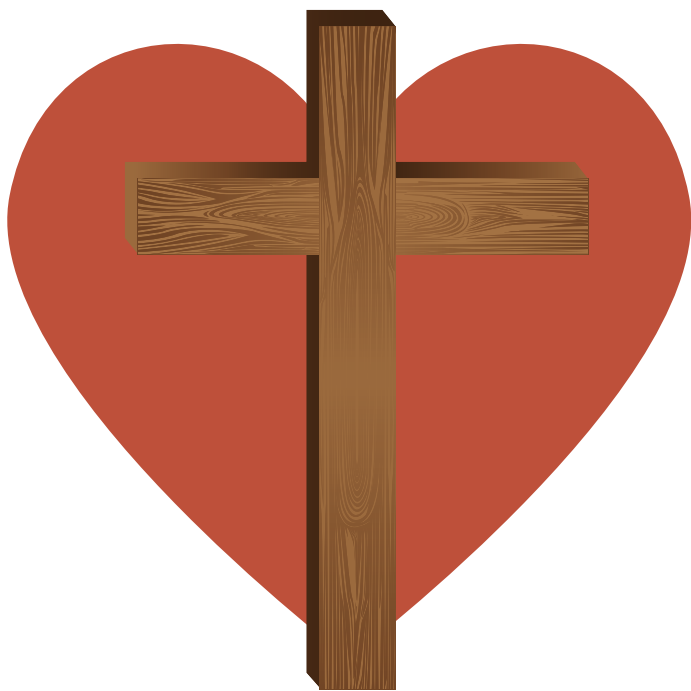
God gave His son Jesus to die on the cross for our sins so that we would be saved and in a right relationship with Him.

What is sin? Every time we decide to do things our own way instead of God's way that is sin.

Sin puts us in a wrong relationship with God and deserves punishment. But because God loves us, he sent Jesus to make right our wrongs. Jesus took our punishment and now we are forgiven! God gives us Justice through Jesus. *Justice simply means to make right what is wrong!* Can you say that with me? **Justice means what?** *To make right what is wrong.* Let's check out today's memory verse and create hand motions to help us remember it! Luke 10:27 *Display verse & memorize.*

“Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind”; and, ‘Love your neighbor as yourself.’”

Luke 10:27



Lesson and Video

Explain how God's love makes us people who love others, and how God calls us to seek justice for others.

We've talked about why we should love God with all our heart and soul and strength and mind, We love because God loved us first! We also know that God's love "seeks to make right the wrong", to make right the wrong that comes from sin in our lives. And then, God calls us to follow Jesus and love our neighbor like we love ourselves.

Who do you think God means when he says to love our neighbors?

Loving your neighbor isn't just for our family and friends. God made all people in His image, and His love is available for all people in the same way, God's Justice "seeks to make right what is wrong" and it is for everyone no matter what.

So when we see people being hurt or mistreated we should seek to make right the wrong in their lives like we would do for ourselves!

God tells us in His word that His love is patient, that love is kind. Listen to how he describes love: *Love does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. Love does not dishonor others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. Love always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres. Love never fails.* We must always seek to love God and love our neighbors because our great teacher God, never fails. He shows us how to love Him and our neighbors (others).1 Corinthians 13:4-8

Bible Storytime

Look at the parable of the Good Samaritan to understand what God means when he calls us to love others.

Now we finally get to dive into the Bible and hear what God has to say to us! We're looking at a parable that Jesus told. A parable is a simple story Jesus used to teach us big lessons. Listen carefully as I read the Bible--these are God's words to us! This is from the gospel of Luke, chapter 10.



On one occasion an expert in the law stood up to test Jesus. “Teacher,” he asked, “what must I do to inherit eternal life?”

“What is written in the Law?” he replied. “How do you read it?”

He answered, “‘Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind’[c]; and, ‘Love your neighbor as yourself.’

“You have answered correctly,” Jesus replied. “Do this and you will live.” But he wanted to justify himself, so he asked Jesus, “And who is my neighbor?”

In reply Jesus said: “A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, when he was attacked by robbers. They stripped him of his clothes, beat him and went away, leaving him half dead. A priest happened to be going down the same road, and when he saw the man, he passed by on the other side. So too, a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan, as he traveled, came where the man was; and when he saw him, he took pity on him. He went to him and bandaged his wounds, pouring on oil and wine. Then he put the man on his own donkey, brought him to an inn and took care of him. The next day he took out two denarii[e] and gave them to the innkeeper. ‘Look after him,’ he said, ‘and when I return, I will reimburse you for any extra expense you may have.’

“Which of these three do you think was a neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of robbers?”

The expert in the law replied, “The one who had mercy on him.”

Bible Story Q & A

Let's see what the children remember from the parable as you explain it.



1. What is a simple story that Jesus often told in the Bible called? A parable.
2. Who stood up and asked Jesus a question? An expert in the law.
3. What happened to the man who was traveling? He was attacked, stripped of his clothes, and left injured on the side of the road.
4. Who were the two men who decided not to help the man? The priest and the Levite
5. Why do you think they didn't help?
6. Who decided to help the man, and how did he help? The Samaritan man, an enemy of the Jews. He traveled, came where the man was; and when he saw him, he took pity on him. He went to him and bandaged his wounds, pouring on oil and wine. Then he put the man on his own donkey, brought him to an inn and took care of him. We thank Jesus for teaching us to love even our enemies through this parable. When we see our neighbors hurting, and needing help we should be quick to make the wrong we see right.

Summary & Application

What does it mean for us that God loves justice?

How does that change how we treat others?



Today we learned that God is a lover of Justice. Justice means “to make right what is wrong, or to restore.” The Samaritan man saw that the man lying in the road was in bad shape. The Samaritan took pity and showed the man love and compassion.

Today we realized that our neighbors can include our family and friends, but also people who are from different races, live in different places, people who are hurting, the poor, the hungry, the sick, the homeless, people who think differently than we do, and the list could go on and on.

The Samaritan in today’s Bible story would have been considered an outcast, and enemy of the Jewish people. Yet God uses this story to show us an example of His love that didn’t come from who we would expect. As religious leaders, the priest and the Levite, should have been the first to come and restore the man on the side of the road. They could have wanted to help, but they chose not to. James 1:22 says, “That we should not just listen to the word, but do what it says.”

When we see anyone who needs to be restored, or “to make right what is wrong” we should help them. The Samaritan came to where the man was, when he saw the man he took pity on him. He bandaged his wounds, pouring on oil and wine. Then, he put the man on his own donkey, and brought him to an inn and took care of him. The next day he took out two denarii, and gave it to the innkeeper. He told the innkeeper, “Look after him, and when I return I will reimburse you for any extra expense you may have.”

Take five minutes to think of some ways you have acted like the priest and Levite when you saw something wrong. Allow children to share. Now, let’s think about how we could have helped in that situation. Allow children to share.

When we tell the truth about what we’ve done wrong, God will make it right in our hearts toward Him. James 5:16 says: Therefore confess your sins to each other and pray for each other so that you may be healed. The prayer of a righteous person is powerful and effective.

Respond through Prayer

Thank you Jesus for patiently loving us. Thank you for your example of perfect love. Lord we pray, that we will love you with all of our heart and with all of our soul and with all our strength and with all our mind and that we would love our neighbors as ourselves.

When we see things that are wrong, help us to be like the Samaritan. We pray that when we see wrongs, that we would make things right. We pray that we would know you, that we would know justice and know your peace. Forgive us for how we handled injustice in the past. Please give us a mind like Jesus. Help us to love you God and love our neighbors. In Jesus' name we pray, Amen.

Teaching Tips:

One way to help younger children regain focus is to give a few simple instructions – any instructions – in rapid succession (everyone stand up, everyone sit down, everyone wiggle your toes, everyone cover your eyes, and everyone open your ears!) “Now we are going to learn about God.” The attention is now on you because they are curious to hear what you are going to do next!
